

COACHING STAFF



Bob McGee is entering his sixteenth year of coaching high school soccer. Coach McGee played on DeSales High Schools first two varsity soccer teams and was captain for both of those seasons. He went on to Adrian College where he was named captain as a sophomore.

Coach McGee obtained his National "D" Coaching License in 1999. After serving as an assistant coach at several schools, Coach McGee became head coach at DeSales, where he led them to four consecutive District Finals, two Regional Championships, and a State Title in 1995. 2000 will be McGee's third year at Upper Arlington High School. His first two years as UA women's soccer coach include a team record of 28-7-5, 1998 District Title and Regional runner-up. In 1999, UA won its first OCC Championship in women's soccer. The team was also awarded the Outstanding Sportmanship Team Award by the Central Ohio Referee's and Licking County Referee's Association.

Allison Scott grew up in Canton, Ohio where she played soccer for Jackson High School. She played college soccer for Capital University. She was named Captain her junior and senior year. She was voted MVP her senior year after helping her team win their first League Championship.

After graduation, Allison served as an assistant coach at Capital for two years. During these two years, Capital won another league championship, two league tournaments and received a bid to the NCAA tournament for the first time ever. This is Allison's first year at Upper Arlington High School.




Selene Martin

Golden Bears girls eye a return to soccer elite

Two years ago, they were surprising upstarts.

Last fall, they were young.

And, perhaps to some extent, overly confident of repeating their district championship-winning effort of the previous year.

But as third-year Upper Arlington girls soccer coach Bob McGee recently admitted, last November's disappointing 1-0 loss to Thomas Worthington in the district quarterfinals served as an abject lesson to his Golden Bears girls.

"There were a lot of expectations, based on the success we'd had in 1998, but we were a young team last year (starting as many as five sophomores and two freshmen)," McGee said. "We had a very successful regular season (posting an 11-3-2 record, which included a first-ever Ohio Capital Conference title, shared with Olentangy, and a 2-0 shutout of the Cards in the final league game), but I think the fact we had won that regular-season game might have led to us overlooking Worthington in the tournament."

"Now we know better. We're not a surprise anymore - I think the last two years have proven we're the real thing, and we're going to be around (the top teams in the district) year after year. But we also understand now we can't take anything, or anyone, for granted."

It's a lesson McGee feels his 2000 Bears booters have taken to heart. "There's a feeling of unfinished business," he said.

And with nine of 11 starters and 15 total returners back in uniform this fall, there's also a lot of confidence on

Ridgeview Road that business - which includes a first-ever OCC Cardinal Division title in the newly revamped league (which now conforms to the normal divisional alignments) - will be concluded.

McGee, who took DeSales to a state championship before

coming to UA, begins his third season with the Black and Gold claiming this squad is "the quickest I have ever coached, across the board."

"The midfield is probably the strongest I've had in three years here, and our four defenders are the best unit I've coached - ever." So much for the soft sell.

Then again, the reasons for McGee's enthusiasm are obvious. Graduation claimed just two starters, forward Alicia Pauling (UA's third-leading scorer last year with 8 goals and 4 assists) and second team All-OCC defender Sharon Kirsch, as well as OCC Honorable Mention defender Ginny Wilson.

Anchoring the deep, experienced core of returning veterans are senior co-captains Claire Dewalt and Anne Stegmiller, both of whom will be playing new positions this fall.

Dewalt, the OCC Cardinal Player of the Year and Honor-

able Mention All-Ohio last fall as a sweeper will be given the opportunity to improve markedly on her 3-goal, 2-assist scoring total of '99 with a move up to center midfielder. "She is such a talented player we felt we had to give her

more touches, and she is going to be a tremendous asset and scoring threat in the middle," McGee said.


Stegmiller, who finished the season UA's goalkeeper (with eight shutouts and just

five goals allowed in the final 12 games) is also moving into the field, replacing Dewalt as sweeper.

Up front, junior Mackenzie Tesner, a first-team all-league forward, is back after leading the Bears with 23 goals and 7 assists, while junior Sarah Wall (15 goals, 7 assists), another first team All-OCC selection, is back as either a forward or center midfielder.

Junior outside middle Alison McKay (4 goals, 4 assists), a second team all-league pick last fall, will be back in the midfield again, but probably as a center mid this fall, according to McGee, along with returning junior Maureen Gorman (4 goals, 1 assist) and returning sophomore Katie Boyd (3 goals, 4 assists).

Returning starters providing the muscle on defense are: senior Andrea Waite, who could also play up front; jun-

ior Lauren Pisciotta, a half-back last year who is being looked at as a starting defender; and junior Blair Heiser.

Vying for starting nods are four other returning veterans. Senior Emily Bullock will see action as an outside midfielder, with juniors Alison Janowicz (1 goal, 1 assist) and Lindsay Ziegler (3 assists) in the mix at forward. Sophomore Kristen Matthews, up from last year's 10-2-3 JV squad, could break into the starting lineup as an outside defender.

In goal, juniors Alicia Gaulke and Liza Benson return, anxious to both improve on last year's save numbers and be named UA's No. 1 keeper.

There are just two new faces on this year's varsity roster, but McGee expects freshmen Lauren Terakedis and Danielle Wilkinson to both see minutes as either forwards or midfielders.

"With the depth and speed we have this year, the competition in practice alone has been a tremendous help," the Bears skipper said. "We literally have 14 or 15 girls pushing for the starting spots."

UA's schedule must still contend with the traditional area girls' soccer powers. Coffman, Westerville South, Worthington Kilbourne and Watterson remain the prime non-league challengers, while the Cards and a Dublin Scioto squad that also returns

a lot of veterans (including Parade Magazine All-American Kathy Fulk) will be the top challengers for OCC Cardinal supremacy.

"There's no doubt we have the talent, experience and work ethic to accomplish a lot

of things," McGee said. "We just have to remember the hard lesson we learned last year."

If they do, the 2000 UA girls SoccerBears just may finish business this year in Crew Stadium.



New Era Begins

NEW ERA BEGINS: APPROACHING THE 21ST CENTURY: 1998, 1999, 2000.

Changes, many changes are happening as we approach the 21st Century. As we began our 1998 season at UAHS, the **Columbus Crew** was playing their final season in Ohio Stadium. Meanwhile, the new Crew arena facility was under construction. Pro farm teams were also gaining strength.

One of our first changes was the arrival of a **new coach** for Women's Soccer at UAHS. He is **Coach Bob McGee**. Assisting him were **Chris Duff** of the professional team the Blast (affiliated with the Columbus Crew), and Beckett Broh. McGee formerly coached at St. Francis DeSales High School when they won the 1995 State Div. II Championship. McGee believes in **dedication, loyalty, and discipline**. Look at the results for 1998, 1999, and 2000: 45-7-8 combined! Coach McGee is tough and puts his players through very **rigorous physical training** to prepare for the season. While their club soccer teams have pre-conditioned most of these players, McGee has taken their **fitness and conditioning** to the next level. There is also **mental conditioning** involved with the workouts. Underneath all the discipline and conditioning, **McGee is a guy who loves his team and his sport**. In the 2000 season, **Coaches Laura Burt, Allison Scott, Aidjia Kelley, and Selene Martin** complemented the coaching staff well, each one adding her own unique talents and perspective. (See biographies.)

Secondly, **Coach McGee** initiated the idea that the team be named the **Women's Soccer Team**. All other teams in OHSA and at the high school are called "Girls'." With the Information Age comes increased awareness of life, more choices, and difficult decisions. The role choices and opportunities for young women are many, and arising conflicts create a need for resolution by decisions. Clearly, more responsibility has been placed on our young women. This increased responsibility may be the catalyst for this image change. Time will tell if this concept will spread to other sports at UAHS and beyond.

Thirdly, another change in 1998 was greater community support for the program. The first soccer program and listing of records was compiled in 1997 by parents **Dave and Lori Hall**, whose daughter **Krissi** was captain in 1997. **Kim and Lynn Gilmer** together with **Dennis and Susan McKay** did a tremendous job on the first full-sized **Program** in 1998 and an awesome **Poster** with the schedule. **This was the first full-sized program in Ohio for Girls'/Women's soccer**. **John Stegmiller** has worked hard for the past three seasons keeping **Statistics** on our team and our opponents. Thomas Worthington parents were so chagrined by their team play, they turned the lights out in the press box. Stegmiller provided weekly updates to the team and the **news media**. Some of this information has found its way into news articles giving more detail and information to the reader. **Keeping not only score, but statistics has elevated the game and interest in it to a new level. It gives credit to defensive as well as offensive players.** Together, **John and Carol Stegmiller** have researched all known information about women's soccer at Upper Arlington, and have developed statistics and comparisons of the seasons and the players and coaches who have built our sport. The **Stegmiller's** created the concept of the published yearbook, as they had done previously for girls' tennis and baseball. **The yearbook was another first in Ohio.** Stegmiller's blitz assembly of the **1998, 1999, and 2000 Women's Soccer Yearbooks** has been fueled by the **McKays**. The accuracy of the statistics would not have been possible without the efforts of the **spotting team** made up of **Ray Tesner, crazy Steve Heiser, and Boy Bruce (Wall)** in his abbreviated knickers in the press box. **Announcer Dan Donovan** gave us the professional touch on the mike.

Finally, **Brad and Connie Waite** initiated the "Just For Kicks" golf outing, providing a strong financial foundation for the entire soccer season. **Chuck Matthews'** photography captured many great memories. Spreads by **Susan Janowicz & Co.** became gourmet events. The **Gorman's** game programs were perfect. **Carol DeWalt** and the **Zipf** family kept our stomachs full at the home games. Goodie bags by soccer buddies, poms by the Stegmillers, signs and helium balloons by **Connie Waite, Carol DeWalt**, and others got us psyched to play. **Tom and Linda Bullock** helped us through the tough times with their loyalty, humor, and perspective. Crowd support was enhanced by the offer of free admission to UAHS students, courtesy of the Parents' Fund. **Peter Benson's** game films enabled the team to see their strengths and weaknesses. Our finale banquet organized by **Laura Pisciotta** put the icing on the cake.

Without **Cathy Ventresca** bringing more bottled water sport drinks, ice, and Ace bandages, we might not have fielded a team on some occasions. One of the successes of the 2000 season was that **Claire DeWalt** kept her lunch

in her stomach. **Anne Stegmiller** practiced sport psychology without a permit and 'took one for the team' in the head. She's re-learning subtraction from 100. **Alison Janowicz** redefined the term 'cracking your back.' **Joanna Bechtel** ordered a new ACL. The Women with Wheels 'laid rubber' all over the playing field. It's possible that we're watching the development of a high school All-American soccer player.

It's not known if it will be known or when it will be known if anyone can know who has been elected President of the United States, or if so, how he did it.

During the season, the players were busy visiting Wallhalla, organizing buddy activities, practicing, playing, winning, conditioning, getting nails done for Homecoming, doing homework, getting lost on the way to the Haunted House, buying still more deodorant, shampoo, shingards and going to football and boys' soccer games. 

UAHS WOMEN'S SOCCER HISTORY

UAHS CLUB SOCCER 1980-82

The enthusiasm for Girls' Soccer in Upper Arlington began a mere 19 years ago. A small group of high school girls under the leadership of **Bill Keethler** formed an independent club team. Keethler (whose daughter played) had himself played soccer as a student at OSU, and was very interested in seeing a soccer program begin at UAHS.

School Board Member JoAnn Davis was also very interested in the development of girls' soccer. She had coached soccer at Jones Middle School, and wanted to see the sport continue at the high school. Because of the interest of **Bill Keethler**, **JoAnn Davis**, and that of **UAHS Principal Dave Shelby** (whose daughter played), girls' soccer gained status as a club team at UAHS in 1980. **Coach Dick Henry**, was recruited to be the club coach for the first two years (1980-82).

UAHS GIRLS' VARSITY SOCCER 1982-1997

Dick Henry was the coach in 1982 when Girls' Soccer was first elevated to a varsity sport. He continued as Varsity Head Coach through the 1985 season, when he retired to become an ardent fan. In the beginning, the Girls' Varsity Soccer Team had choice of only a few opponents, needing to repeat opponents during the season to fill the schedule. This is quite different from the active season we see today! Our program has come a long way since its beginning and a lot of the growth is due to the community support the girls and the sport received.

At the same time that girls' soccer was developing its program at the high school, there was a program developing in the community at large. In 1984, **John Petro** began a soccer program for 4th - 6th graders sponsored by the UAAA. The **Upper Arlington Kiwanis** also got into the action when **Bill Snellgrove** introduced the **Kiwanis Soccer Program**. When it began, teams were coed, but by 1985, girls had their own league. The program mushroomed in size and continued to swell with the development of the **Eagles Select Soccer Team** and other local select teams. The formation of the **Tri-Village Soccer Association (TVSA)** was significant in the organizational and promotional aspects. Today the freshmen that try out for the UAHS Women's Soccer Team are coming with years of playing experience and the quality of play has elevated immensely.

The success of Women's Soccer at UA is not only a result of community programs, but also that of our high school coaches. Beginning with **Coach Dick Henry** (1982-85), and continuing through UA's only female head soccer coach, **Susan Hoffman** (1986), followed by the highly spirited **Tom Mastrandreu** (1987). **Dick Henry** came out of 'retirement' for a year (1988), followed by **Nick Moulakis** (1989-92), and then **Terry Johnston** (1993-97).

The first UA Women's Soccer player to earn a **Division I college soccer scholarship** was **Sherri Noble**. Sherri earned a soccer scholarship to Duke University in 1987. She also played at Ohio Wesleyan University. Sherri went on to earn a law degree from Capital University with a unique specialization in Sports Management in coordination with Ohio University. She is currently a Manager at the Walt Disney Wide World of Sports Complex in Orlando.

UA moving players around to capitalize on excellent speed

For the Upper Arlington High School girls soccer team, plugging the holes left by last year's five seniors was not a question of "if," but of "how."

Coach Bob McGee's answer: Move people to other positions to take advantage of what the 16-year coach called possibly the quickest team he's had.

The biggest changes have occurred with senior Claire DeWalt, the OCC-Cardinal Division Player of the Year who has moved from sweeper to center-midfielder, and senior co-captain Anne Stegmiller, who has moved from goalie to sweeper.

Also switching positions for the Golden Bears, who followed a district championship by finishing 12-4-2 a year ago and losing 1-0 to Thomas Worthington in a district semifinal, is junior Lauren Pisciotta (from center-midfielder to left defender).

Gone for Upper Arlington, which beat Thomas 2-0 in the 1998 district final and went 4-0-1 to tie Dublin Coffman for last year's OCC-Central Division title, are second-team all-league selection Sharon Kirch (defender) and honorable-mention all-OCC pick Ginny Wilson (defender) along with Jessie Irene (midfielder), Alicia Pauling and Cherie Taylor (midfielder). Pauling had eight goals and four assists.

"Most of the team was sophomores and a lot of these girls have two years under their belts, which is going to make a huge difference," said McGee, who has a 28-7-5 mark in two seasons with the Golden Bears as he led the school to its

first league title a year ago. "We had to fill two spots in the back so we did some changing up with Ann Stegmiller, who will run at sweeper and Lauren Pisciotta, who is moving from center-midfielder to left defender. With Claire DeWalt, we've moved her up from sweeper to get her more touches."

"We'll play a very quick style because we've got (a lot of) quickness. We'll also play possession as much as we can so we don't play too much kickball."

"I like (playing in the midfield) a lot," added DeWalt, who was first-team all-district and honorable mention all-state. "It's a ton more running than sweeper, but you can direct more. It's a fun change."

Moving in at goalkeeper after playing on defense last year is junior Blair Heiser, along with junior Annie Hatcher, who played junior varsity last year. Stegmiller started in the midfield but shifted to goalkeeper five games into the season and responded with a 0.58 goals-against average with eight shutouts.

Along with DeWalt at center-midfielder is junior Sarah Wall while outside-midfielders include junior Maureen Gorman and junior

Alison McKay. At forward will be juniors Mackenzie Tesner and Lindsay Zigler while junior Kristen Matthews and senior Andrea Waite are competing at outside back. Sophomore Katie Boyd also will play midfield.

Tesner and Wall joined DeWalt as first-team all-OCC picks while Stegmiller and McKay were named to the second team. Tesner scored 23 goals and has 37 goals in two years to rank third on the school's all-time list and was second-team all-district, while Wall had 15 goals and a team-high eight assists and was honorable mention all-district. McKay had four goals and four assists.

For the first time, girls soccer will have the same conference alignment as in the other sports. The Golden Bears, who were third-seeded for last year's district tournament and opened with an 11-0 victory Newark, will play in the OCC-Cardinal along with Thomas, Dublin Scioto, Olentangy, Chillicothe and Reynoldsburg. While the eighth-seeded Cardinals won the district before falling 2-0 to Westerville South in a regional semifinal last year, Reynoldsburg fell 8-0 to Watterson in a district semifinal after defeating Chillicothe 5-0 in the second round, Scioto lost 5-4 to the Eagles in a second-round contest and seventh-seeded Olentangy lost 2-0 to Kilbourne in a second-round game.

"I think we should have maybe even a better season than last year," Stegmiller said. "We have some freshmen that are going to work hard, and we've been able to replace the people we lost. We have a strong player at every position. Things are coming together."

UA girl strikers continue habit of blanking foes

Upper Arlington's girls soccer team established itself as one of the best defensive units in Central Ohio over the last couple of years.

It appears that despite some early-season juggling by coach Bob McGee, the Bears will once again be a formidable team to score against. UA kicked off the 2000 campaign with a pair of shutouts last week, blanking Gahanna 1-0 Aug. 29 and scoring two goals the final 40 minutes Thursday to break a scoreless halftime tie at Hilliard Davidson en route to a 2-0 win.

"We got off to slow starts in both games, but we did a good job getting better quality shots as the game went on," McGee said. "We just need to concentrate on taking better shots and working a little harder up front."

Despite the relatively low scores, the Bears dominated both contests, averaging 15 shots a game to a combined 11 by both opponents, all saved by goalie Liza Benson.

Junior Anne Hatcher accounted for the lone goal at Gahanna with 37:20 left in the first half, while junior forwards Mackenzie Tesner and Ali Janowicz scored at Davidson, both goals coming off assists from sophomore midfielder Katie Boyd in the 50 and 51st minute.

McGee's main concern in rotating personnel so far has been to settle on who will be his starting defenders. "The second half at Davidson we went with (junior) Maureen Gorman, (senior) Andrea Waite and (senior captain) Claire DeWalt along with (senior captain) Anne Stegmiller, and that seemed to work very well," McGee said. "I expect we'll try and rotate Claire and Anne between sweeper and midfield the rest of the way, because both are also excellent ball-handlers and scorers."

Saturday's home opener against Mansfield Christian

was cancelled, meaning McGee's squad will not play its first home match until a week from Thursday (Sept. 14). The Bears traveled to Springboro Monday, a last-minute addition to the schedule, visit Chillicothe for the OCC Cardinal opener Thursday and travel to Granville Saturday before finishing the six-game road stand next Tuesday at Dublin Coffman.

Curt Bixel's SoccerBears headed into Tuesday's annual showdown with Worthington Kilbourne a team still trying to overcome a major loss in its

final preseason tuneup.

Senior forward Kyle Edwards, the Bears' top returning goal scorer from 1999 (5 goals, 2 assists) suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament during a preseason scrimmage against Dublin Coffman at the Kilbourne Super Scrimmage Aug. 19. Bixel reported Edwards was slated to have surgery on the knee this week and will be lost for the entire season.

"At this point we're still trying to figure out just what we're going to do," the Bears coach said. "We've basically

Girls Soccer UA searching for best lineup combo

Upper Arlington High School girls soccer coach Bob McGee has been like a safecracker with a large set of numbers to decode when it comes to determining his team's lineup.

While a few lineup changes occurred during the preseason as the Golden Bears have been forced to replace five seniors after going 12-4-2 a year ago, McGee has continued to search for the combination which will bring maximum efficiency.

During the second half of last Thursday's non-league contest against Hilliard Davidson, Upper Arlington came across a mix which created 13 shots and both goals of a 2-0 road victory.

But more experimenting is likely on the way for Upper Arlington, which traveled to Springboro last Tuesday and will open OCC-Central Division play Thursday at Chillicothe before completing a six-game road swing to start the season Saturday at Granville and Tuesday at Dublin Coffman in non-league games.

The Bears opened with a 1-0 victory over non-league Gahanna on Aug. 29.

"In the first half (against Davidson) we were just trying to figure out how to play, and it was pretty much back and forth," said McGee, whose team had just two shots during the first 20 minutes and seven overall for the first half. "In the second half we just kind of changed up our lineup a little bit and basically a couple players, Katie Boyd and Alison Janowicz, started pushing the play to the box. We had a number of opportunities and didn't finish. We started putting the ball in more dangerous situations."

"I think putting kids in different positions requires other team members to figure out the style of play of the players beside them. For the last 10 minutes Katie Boyd went to the center-midfield and we also moved Lauren Pisciotto to the center-midfield, and that helped open up the offense. During the last part of the

game, we moved Claire DeWalt back to sweeper (from forward) and that helped. Her presence back there and her ability to communicate made a big difference.


"I think in both of our games the defense for the first part of the game struggled. We're still trying to figure out our personnel in back. We're going to experiment for the next couple days in practice, and for the games we'll still move personnel around. I like the ability of having players play two or three different positions. The key is to find the kids and put them where strengths are."

While the goal against Gahanna was scored by Annie Hatcher off a rebound with 1 minute, 20 seconds to go in the first half, Janowicz gave the Bears a 1-0 lead against Davidson when she scored on an assist from Boyd with 10:14 remaining. Mackenzie Tesner gave Upper Arlington a 2-0 lead with 9:25 left on another assist by Boyd.

Sophomore goalkeeper Liza Benson finished with three saves against Gahanna and had only two against Davidson, but both came on potential one-on-one opportunities by the Wildcats.

DeWalt, who was first-team all-district and honorable mention all-state as sweeper last year, is likely to continue to spend time at both sweeper and forward, depending on the situation. Senior Anne Stegmiller, who started at midfield and goalkeeper a year ago, was moved to sweeper during the preseason but saw action at forward against the Wildcats.

"(DeWalt is) one of those players I know her strongest place is in the back as a sweeper," said McGee, whose team will face a Dublin Coffman squad which went 4-0-1 in the OCC-Central to share the title with the Bears as the teams played to a scoreless tie. "But she's also one of those kids where you need to provide her with opportunities to move her forward. There are games where we'll have to put her in at midfielder or stopper, but sometimes in the early part of the season you go with leadership and kids' strengths to

allow other kids to develop and move along. We've moved (Stegmiller) from sweeper to more of an attacking position because she can provide us with good defense."


Upper Arlington will be indefinitely without junior forward Lindsay Zigler, who has been battling a

hip injury.

"I don't know anything about (Chillicothe)," McGee said. "I don't think they're one of the stronger teams in the league, but in the situation we're in, we play our first six games on the road. The kids have got to travel, they're tired from

school. The key is that we've just got to get through this stretch healthy and it will be great once we're at home."

"(Granville's a) pretty stingy team, one of the better Division II schools. It's going to be a matter of us coming out and playing."

The Bears (5-0, 1-0 OCC Cardinal Division) opened league play Thursday with a 7-0 blowout at Chillicothe. Boyd, Tesner and Wall each tallied an assist, as did

The Upper Arlington High School girls soccer team has been getting the job done defensively.

On the way to a 5-0 start entering last Tuesday's non-league game against Dublin Coffman, the Golden Bears had shut out their opponents 15-0 with the largest margin coming last Thursday in a 7-0 pounding at Chillicothe in the OCC-Cardinal Division opener.

Junior goalkeeper Liza Benson has been just one of the keys for Upper Arlington, which is ranked fourth in the Division I area coaches poll behind Coffman, Westerville North and DeSales and continues OCC-Cardinal play Thursday at home against Reynoldsburg before remaining home Saturday to face Athens.

Also key has been the play of senior Claire DeWalt, the league's player of the year a year ago at sweeper who moved from the back to the front during the preseason but has moved back to defense where she is the anchor along with senior co-captain Anne Stegmiller and junior Maureen Gorman. Junior Blair Heiser and Annie Hatcher also have been effective at stopper.


"We're putting together a real string of successes," said coach Bob McGee, whose team's next league game after Reynoldsburg will be Sept. 21 at Thomas Worthington. "We're pretty much shutting down our opponents so far. I just think we've been playing real well in the back."

"I just think we've been communicating pretty well in back," Stegmiller added. "There's a lot of different players back there that are solid and our chemistry has been good in the back."

Upper Arlington, which tied Dublin Coffman at 4-0-1 for last year's OCC-Central title before realignment this fall, will face a Reynoldsburg squad that went 6-11-2 overall and 2-3-2 in the OCC-Cardinal a year ago.

The Raiders, who opened last year's tournament with victories against Watkins Memorial (5-4) and Chillicothe (5-0) before losing 8-0 to Watterson in a district semifinal, have a new coach in Ellis Byrd.

Among 12 returning letterwinners for the Raiders — who opened 1-3, with their only victory a 2-0 win over Westland on Sept. 5 — are senior forward Jen Eck and senior defender Erika Nies along with junior goalkeeper Daisy Sigman. The Golden Bears crushed the Raiders 7-0 in a non-league contest last season.



"Reynoldsburg's a league opponent and I think they're struggling a little bit," said McGee, whose team defeated Springboro 3-0 on Sept. 5 and Granville 2-0 last Saturday. "I don't think (Athens) is particularly strong."


"We're still working out where players should be and technique, but we're starting to jell as a team," Byrd said. "The girls are slowly starting to get it. ... But I'm going to change my style of coaching a bit. I'm used to working with college kids. In high school, they're not quite there yet."

While DeWalt had both goals and Katie Boyd and MacKenzie Tesner each had assists against Granville, Tesner had a hat trick, Lauren Pisciotto added two goals and Boyd and Sarah Wall each scored one goal against Chillicothe.

The Bears, who led 5-0 over the Cavaliers at halftime, received assists from Boyd, Tesner, Stegmiller, Wall and Alison McKay.

"I think part of the Granville game had to do with the field conditions," said McGee, whose team received two goals from Tesner and one from Wall against Springboro. "It was muddy and there was not much grass. Our kids came out playing the ball and we dominated most of the play. It was a good game for our keeper and defenders."

"Offensively I think we're getting a little better each game. We're getting better shot selection and we're starting to see some good combinations."



UA girl booters remain unbeaten

Dublin Coffin's Sham-Rocks once again spoiled what had been a perfect season for Upper Arlington's girls soccer team Sept. 12, battling Bob McGee's booters to their second tie in as many years.

Junior forward Sarah Wall's second-half score provided the equalizer to Coffin's Megan Lindberg's first-half goal, allowing the Bears to escape with a 1-1 tie against the 'Rocks (2-0-2 at the time).

The first goal allowed in five straight games apparently didn't sit well with the Bears, who took out their anger on their two remaining opponents last week — and scored more goals in those two games than in the first six combined.

Junior forward Mackenzie Tesner led the barrage Thursday, scoring two goals in a 9-0 OCC Cardinal Division blowout of Reynoldsburg. Seven other players found the net: Wall, junior midfielder Alison McKay, senior co-captains Claire DeWalt and Anne Stegmiller,

sophomore Kathryn Mueller and freshmen Lauren Terakedis and Danielle Wilkinson. Goalie Liza Benson had to make just one save for the evening.

Saturday, UA proved even more inhospitable a host to visiting Athens, mauling the Bulldogs 11-0. Tesner, sophomore midfielder Katie

Boyd and junior forward Ali Janowicz all netted two goals, while McKay, Wall, Wilkinson, senior Andrea Waite and junior Anne Hatcher added solo shots. Benson tallied two saves in a short stint in goal while backup Alicia Gaulke added one.

UA (7-0-1 overall, 2-0 OCC Cardinal) faces a major league test Thursday when the Bears visit Thomas Worthington, anxious to avenge last year's district quarterfinal loss to the Cards and stay atop the division. McGee's squad returns home next

Tuesday to host Westerville South.

UA ready for OCC test against Cards

Upper Arlington High School girls soccer player Alison McKay is quick to point out her team's striving attitude about Thursday's meeting at Thomas Worthington.

That focus might be there because the Bears have a score to settle with the Cardinals.

Last season, when both teams were in the OCC-Central Division, Upper Arlington defeated the Cardinals 2-0 during the regular season on the way to sharing the title at 4-0-1 with Dublin Coffman. But during the post-season, Thomas knocked out the Bears in a Division I district semifinal with a 1-0 victory on the way to earning a district championship and finishing 11-7-2 overall.

The Cardinals will be the first real test of the OCC-Cardinal schedule for Upper Arlington, which improved to 6-0-1 overall and 2-0 in the league with a 9-0 pounding of visiting Reynoldsburg last Thursday.

"I think we're looking forward to it," said McKay, who scored with 14 minutes, 57 seconds left in the first half against the Raiders to make it 5-0. "We'll come out strong and we'll be ready for them."

The Cardinals have a new look, as 10 players including Kacy McMillan (second-team all-district), Katie Tumblin (first-team all-district), Marilee Oldfield (second-team all-OCC) and Callie Soliz (second-team all-OCC) and coach Mark Phillips (51-

21-8 in four seasons) are gone. Phillips left to become an assistant with the University of Indianapolis women's soccer team and has been replaced by Doug Dosky.

Thomas improved to 2-0 in the league with a 9-0 victory over Chillicothe last Thursday as Ashley Swinehart had a hat trick and Leslie Dawley, Dana Steiner, Laura Merkel, Sasha Growick, Jennifer Beckwith and Kelli Bring all added one goal.

Swinehart was the OCC-Central Player of the Year and the captain of the ThisWeek Super 12 team in 1998.

Upper Arlington will follow by playing host Tuesday to Westerville South, which beat Grove City 1-0 last Thursday and is 2-1-3 entering last Tuesday.

"We've got two big games in a row," said coach Bob McGee, whose team tied Dublin Coffman at 1 on Sept. 12 in non-league play. "The nice thing is that will show us what we're good at and what we're not good at."

"Thomas Worthington has a lot of dangerous scorers, and South plays great defense and has a great goalkeeper. These are the games that we want to play. Thomas will be competitive and Westerville South is always a tough opponent."

Eight players scored against Reynoldsburg, as Claire DeWalt made it 1-0 with 25:52 to go in the first half and Mackenzie Tesner scored back-to-back goals at the 22:30 and 22:01 marks of the first half for a 3-0 lead.

Lauren Terakedi (18:12), McKay

and Sarah Wall (6:55) also scored first-half goals, while Nikki Mueller (15:01), Danielle Wilkinson (10:46) and Anne Stegmiller (:35) each had second-half scores.

Against Dublin Coffman, the Bears tied the score in the second half on a goal by Wall.

"We were prepared and worked hard. It's nice because everyone got

a chance to play," McKay said. "Every game's a new game."

"We have to understand that every game you play you have to play hard, and in the first 14 to 16 minutes of the first half (against Reynoldsburg), we really didn't work hard," McGee added. "But after that we put the ball on the floor more and were looking to combine with more than one player. We

kept them out of our side of the field and there was a lot of unselfish play. It was nice because some of the starters got some time on the bench. We can go four or five deep at some positions.

"I thought we had a good game against Coffman. I think they only had one shot on goal. Our kids just kept playing and from my end, it looked like we dominated."

Bears girls turn tables on soccer Cards

Upper Arlington's girls soccer team had an 11-month wait for a payback end happily Thursday night.

In their first meeting since a district quarterfinal loss last October, Bob McGee's booters avenged their season-ending loss of '99 with a 2-1 decision at Thomas Worthington in their only action last week.

The win not only avenged the Bears' loss last year but also kept them undefeated (8-0-1 overall) and perfect in OCC Cardinal Division play at 3-0, tied with Dublin Scioto for the division lead.

"We came out and played ell from the opening kick, and except for one mistake early in the first half we pretty much controlled the game," McGee said. UA finished with a 14-8 advantage in shots, with goalie Liza Benson needing to make just two saves.

Forward Mackenzie Tesner gave UA a 1-0 lead three minutes into the match off an assist from senior co-captain Claire DeWalt, but the Cards got the equalizer 10 minutes later when Benson was unable to collar a saved shot at close range — only the second goal given up by UA this season.

The contest remained tied 1-1 until 12 minutes left to intermission, when Tesner teamed up with Sara Boyd for the game winner.

With seven shutouts thus far, the UA girls are well on the way to setting a new school mark for most shutouts and fewest goals allowed in a season — a feat McGee admits he didn't expect when the season began.

"I knew we'd be very good defensively with everyone back from last year — but I didn't think we'd be this good," he said. "Claire and (senior co-captain) Anne Stegmiller just

keep getting better and better each game, our depth is better than the past few years, which allows us to keep people fresh, and Liza has been solid in goal (with 14 saves and a .160 goals-against average through nine games)."

The Bears will be out to better that average — and continue their unbeaten string — with Tuesday's home game against Westerville South and Thursday's key visit to Orlentangy for a hoped-for fourth OCC Cardinal victory.

UA girls team steps up to challenge from Cards

Time and again this season, the Upper Arlington High School girls soccer team has looked forward to challenges, and in almost every case it has flourished during them.

Last Thursday's OCC-Cardinal Division contest against Thomas Worthington was one of the Bears' most difficult tests to date, and they responded with strong ball control and physical play on the way to a 2-1 victory.


The win gives Upper Arlington a 3-0 conference record going into Thursday's league matchup at Olentangy, and the Cardinals were one of the biggest stumbling blocks in the way of the Bears making it two league titles in a row.

"We just continued to push the ball forward on offense, and we physically picked up the pace a little bit," said coach Bob McGee, whose team split with the Cardinals last year with the loss coming in the Division I district semifinals.

"We just kept pushing it until the end and toward the end our fitness took over for us.

"I think the kids are just looking to play the top teams, and they knew it was a big game in the OCC. And since they beat us last year in the tournament, (we) had a lot of ammunition going into it. We had a good idea of what they'd try to do and we executed our game plan."

Upper Arlington, which was 8-0-1 overall going into last Tuesday's non-league contest against visiting Westerville South, received both goals from Mackenzie Tesner. She has a team-leading 12 overall.



"I think Claire DeWalt at center-midfielder and Anne Stegmiller at sweeper have been playing well for us," said McGee, whose team will face an Olentangy squad which defeated Reynoldsburg 4-2 last Thursday as Annelise Erpenbeck had two goals and Rachel Gerhardt and Annie Gage both had one goal and was 6-1-1 overall and 1-1 in the conference going into last Saturday's non-league matchup against Delaware.

"Liza Benson had a couple big saves for us, too. Kristen Matthews has been running things at outside-midfielder and Katie Boyd has played well at outside-center midfielder. Sarah Wall has moved from center-midfielder to forward and she's been creating tons of opportunities up front. And the defense has been doing a good job of shutting down oppo-

nents.

"We have to play (at Olentangy), which is a difficult place to play because of their field. We've got to be prepared to play anybody."

"The boys team will attempt to get back on track in the OCC-Cardinal when it plays host to Olentangy on Thursday.

The Bears lost 2-0 to defending league champion Thomas Worthington on Sept. 20 in a game which was stopped three minutes into the second half because of lightning.

"We had some opportunities. One of the shots came in the first 30 seconds," said coach Curt Bixel, whose team dropped to 2-5-1 overall with the loss to the Cardinals and is 1-1-1 in the conference.


"One of (Thomas') goals came when they sent the ball in from the wing and they had time to shoot it inside the box. The second goal was just an extended scrap in the box. They swung at the ball and missed it before they knocked it in.

"We had parts when we looked very good. But we had some parts where we had some defensive (problems) and they made us pay for them."

After facing Thomas, Upper Arlington had scored just three goals in four games as it was shut out twice. The Bears' contest against Gahanna last Saturday was postponed due to bad weather.

"(Improving our offense) is just our next target," said Bixel, whose team also will travel to non-league St. Charles on Saturday before playing host to non-league Westerville North on Tuesday.

"Offense is what we've been working on in practice. I think it's not only finishing that we have a problem with





but it's working the ball into dangerous positions. When we can do both better, that will combine for more scoring opportunities."

Olentangy dropped to 4-3-2 overall and 0-1-1 in the conference with

a 1-0 loss to Reynoldsburg last Thursday. The Braves received two goals from Jeff Sullivan in a 2-all tie against Big Walnut on Sept. 14 and are coached by former Hartley coach John Siles.

No respect.

That's how Upper Arlington's girls are probably feeling this week after being seeded third in the Division I district tournament — despite the fact UA is the lone undefeated Division I team in the field (as of Sunday) with a 10-0-1 record, while top-seeded DeSales and No. 2 seed Worthington Kilbourne both have one loss.

"I guess the fact we don't play DeSales, and we haven't played Kilbourne yet (the Bears visit the Wolves Saturday), coupled with our tie with Coffman was the reason (for the No. 3 ranking)," Bears coach Bob McGee said. "That, and the fact people just don't think we're up there with those other teams yet, in spite of our record."

UA opens tournament play, following a first-round bye, on Oct. 19 against the winner of the Groveport-Whetstone game. The winner will host either Watterson or Walnut Ridge in a district semifinal Oct. 25, though the Bears will have a sneak peek at the Eagles when they host Watterson in a regular-season contest Oct. 12.

McGee's booters picked up their eighth and ninth shutouts of the season last week, blanking Westerville South in a tight contest, 1-0, Sept. 26 and outlasting a physical Olentangy squad on the Braves' narrow field 3-0 Thursday.

Despite a 20-7 advantage in shots, the Bears couldn't crack the Wildcats until Mackenzie Tesner's late goal off a Claire DeWalt assist. UA dominated action, with goalie Liza Benson making just one save.

It took most of the first 40 minutes Thursday for the Bears to adjust to a small field and the bruising tactics of the Braves, but UA opened the second half with two goals in five minutes. Lauren Pisciotto found the net off a Sarah Wall corner kick, and Wall netted a goal herself off another assist from DeWalt, while Tesner netted the third off an assist from Katie Boyd.


Benson and backup goalie Alicia Gaulke rotated in goal, Benson stopping two Braves shots and Gaulke three.

Thursday's win not only raised UA's OCC Cardinal Division mark to 4-0, it also gave McGee a milestone 100th coaching victory for his seven-year career with DeSales and the Bears.

"I'm surprised it came so quickly," McGee admitted. "It just shows I've been fortunate to coach a lot of very good players."

The goal now is to win numbers 101 and 102 against two very formidable opponents this week. Thursday, UA hosts Dublin Scioto, a win assuring the Bears of no worse than a tie for the OCC Cardinal title. But the Irish (3-1) will hope to play the spoilers, led by senior Parade Magazine All-American Kathy Fulk and senior all-league forward Ashley Roush.

Saturday is the road trip to Kilbourne, with an opportunity to prove the tournament seeders wrong. UA then returns home next Tuesday, hopefully to celebrate an undefeated OCC season with a final league win over Hilliard Darby.

McGee earns 100th coaching victory

The Bears improved to 10-0-1 overall and 4-0 in the OCC-Cardinal with a 3-0 victory last Thursday at Olentangy as Lauren Pisciotto scored with 36 minutes, 9 seconds remaining off a corner kick from Sarah Wall. Wall scored on an assist from Claire DeWalt with 34:08 to go and Mackenzie Tesner scored on a pass from Katie Boyd with 10:14 to go.

"I think one of the things was getting the kids to settle down," coach Bob McGee, whose team defeated Westerville South 1-0 on Sept. 26 as Tesner scored in the second half. "We just wanted to play our game. At Olentangy, they've got a small field and it's a little beat up. They're a pretty stingy team. We had opportunities in the first half but just didn't convert them. I think we came out strong and caught them by surprise a little bit."

Upper Arlington, which had 14 shots, has been led offensively all season by Tesner, who had 14 goals and two assists while Wall has six goals and two assists. DeWalt has three goals and five assists and Boyd has three goals and a team-leading six assists.

And defense has remained a strong point for the Bears, who have outscored their opponents 42-2.

"I think on defense what we try to do is put as much pressure on the front play-

ers as we can and hopefully force the players to receive it back toward goal," said McGee, whose team was seeded third in the Division I tournament behind DeSales and Worthington Kilbourne and will open the postseason Oct. 19 at home against Groveport or Whetstone. "We want to put pressure on them and make the offensive team do all the work."

"I'd say they had one or two good looks at the goal, but they didn't have a great shot along the net and those shots all came with under 10 minutes to go when we had our second team in. They had one shot in the first period, one in the second and three in the third period but none were inside 18 (feet)."

•**MILESTONE** — The girls team's victory over Olentangy was the 100th in McGee's career as a girls coach, as he was 62-11-9 from 1993-96 at DeSales and is 38-7-6 in three seasons with the Bears.

McGee was an assistant boys coach at DeSales, Westerville South and Upper Arlington before taking the DeSales girls job, and in between his girls positions spent one season as the Hamilton Township boys coach.

"I had left DeSales because I had four kids and I didn't know if I'd be back coaching," McGee said. "The way things worked out, I ended up coaching again."

UA was leading the tightly-contested match 1-0 with 8:11 to play when an attempted clearing kick bounced off a Bears player's shoulder and

drifted lazily into the net over a frantically lunging Liza Benson to salvage a 1-1 tie for the No. 2-seeded Wolves.

"In effect, it was an own-goal," McGee said, though Wolves senior forward Jenny Dreyer was given credit for the goal. Mackenzie Tesner tallied UA's goal, off an assist

from Alison McKay, with 38:56 left in the second half.

Though the Bears outshot Kilbourne 13-12, Benson was the busier of the two goalies, stopping 11 shots to just four saves by the Wolves.

"It was disappointing, espe-

cially considering they'd been seeded higher (despite having one loss to none for the Bears), and the fact we'd been hearing all season how DeSales and Kilbourne were in a higher class than we were," McGee said. "We feel they were fortunate to tie."

Saturday's deadlock was the only outing for UA last week, after thunderstorms forced Thursday's scheduled matchup with Dublin Scioto to be postponed to this evening.

The makeup game means

four matches in five days to close regular-season play for the Bears, who entered Tuesday's contest against Hilliard Darby 10-0-2 overall and 4-0 in OCC Cardinal play.

"It's going to be a grind, but we've got a lot of motivation for all four games," McGee noted. "Beating Darby ensures at least a tie for the OCC title, with a win over Scioto giving it to us outright."

As for Thursday's visit by Waterson — "it's been a big rivalry for us, and they're a team we could see in the tour-



namment, so we'll be up for that," the Bears skipper said.

Saturday, UA hosts Cincinnati St. Ursula in its home finale, with perhaps the biggest single motivator of all to fuel the tired Bears, the first undefeated record in the history of the 21-year-old girls soccer program.

A four-game winning streak would no doubt also be a nice springboard with which to jump into sectional tournament play next week, with the third-seeded Bears hosting the winner of the Groveport-Whetstone game Oct. 19.

Bears tie Wolves in potential regional semifinal preview

In a matchup of two of the top teams in central Ohio, the Upper Arlington and host Worthington Kilbourne high school girls soccer teams played to a 1-all tie last Saturday.

While the non-league contest was nothing more than a postseason tune-up, it left a score to be settled at 7 p.m. Nov. 1 — if the second-seeded Wolves and No. 3 Bears earn district championships, they would meet in a regional semifinal at Dublin Coffman.

"It was a pretty good game, back and forth," said coach Bob McGee, whose team opens the Division I tournament following a first-round bye at 7 p.m. Oct. 19 at home against the winner of Monday's Groveport-Whetstone contest. "Kilbourne is probably one of the quicker teams we've played. They play forward, get it up top and go with it. We tried to give it everything we've got and attack their back side."

Upper Arlington, which will play host to Dublin Scioto today in a game originally scheduled for last Thursday but postponed because of bad weather, was 10-0-2 overall and 4-0 in the OCC-Cardinal Division entering last Tuesday's game against Hilliard Darby. The Golden Bears also will entertain Wattersson on Thursday and St. Ursula on Saturday in non-league games.

The Bears and Wolves played to a scoreless first half before Upper Arlington made it 1-0 when Mackenzie Tesner scored following a throw-in by Alison McKay.

Kilbourne, which like Upper Arlington has nine shutouts, tied it with 8 minutes, 11 seconds to go on a goal by Jenny Dreyer off a crossing pass.

Upper Arlington had 13 shots on goal while the Wolves had 12.

"Do I think they're a much better team than us? No," McGee said. "The kids came up with a tie, and I don't think we're happy with that. It's a good game for us to play. Our kids have heard a lot about Kilbourne and DeSales, and it was a good experience for the kids to show they're as good as them."

Bears girls make school history with unbeaten slate

Five games in seven days – including three straight.

That's the gauntlet Upper Arlington's girls soccer team had to run last week to achieve three major goals before district tournament play began: win their first undisputed Ohio Capital Conference championship (the Bears shared last year's OCC Central Division title with Dublin Coffman), give the seniors a first-ever win over archrival Watterson and defeat Toledo St. Ursula Saturday afternoon for the first undefeated season in the history of UA soccer – boys or girls.

Mission accomplished.

Relying, as they have all fall, on the stingiest defense in Central Ohio, unprecedented depth and an attack averaging over three goals a game, Bob McGee's Bears outscored four opponents 12-1 between Tuesday and Saturday last week to achieve the hat trick.

UA recorded its 11th shutout of the season Oct. 10 against Hilliard Darby (4-0), then blanked Dublin Scioto (second at the time in the Ohio Capital Conference Cardinal Division) 3-0 Wednesday to sew up the outright league title.

Twenty-four hours later, in their third outing in as many days, the Bears outlasted a

physical Watterson team for a 2-1 victory, only the third against the Eagles in the last nine contests.

And Saturday, running on a nearly-empty tank, McGee's booters had enough gas left to shut down Toledo St. Ursula 3-0 to finish 14-0-2, the first UA soccer team ever to end regular season play without a defeat.

"I've never coached a team that had to play five games in seven days, much less three in a row," McGee said. Even more amazing, UA is McGee's first undefeated squad, though the three-year Bears skipper previously coached DeSales' boys to the 1995 state championship. "We had one loss," he explained.

"These girls really impressed me," McGee said. "They reached down and were determined to win these last four, and they did. This is the level we want to be playing at heading into the tournament."

While Wednesday's and Saturday's games both achieved goals of record for UA, it was Thursday's visit by Watterson the Bears coach and players agreed was the emotional high point of the

week.

"They'd had our number for a few years now," said senior captain Claire Dewalt. "The seniors had never beaten them (including Watterson's win which ended UA's Cinderella 1998 season in the regional finals)."

For a little over 20 minutes Thursday, it looked like the Eagle hex would continue, after Watterson's Rachael Pivarnik scored off a corner kick to put the Bears behind for only the second time this season. But 11 minutes later Dewalt found junior forward Sarah Wall 20 yards in front of the Watterson net, and Wall blasted in the equalizer.

UA, outshooting the Eagles 12-3, stepped up the pressure the final 40 minutes, getting the game-winner from junior Lauren Pisciotto on a steeply angled shot from the right side into the left corner late in the final period after a UA corner. "We didn't get a lot of clean opportunities, but we took advantage when they fouled us in the box," McGee said.

Thursday's win followed two straight days of OCC Cardinal matches that gave the Bears the title. Junior forward Mackenzie Tesner tallied two

goals and Wall and freshman Lauren Terakedis added one apiece Oct. 10 as UA whipped Darby to secure at least a tie for the OCC crown.

The next evening, the Bears overcame a slow first half and Scioto's best 40-minute effort of the year, according to Irish coach Chuck Crawford, before rolling the final half for the 3-0 win. Tesner broke the ice with a close-in goal 8:16 before the half, and added a second at 17:38 of the final period. Wall added the capper with 4:07 to play as the Bears outshot the Irish 22-7.


It was Tesner, Wall and sophomore midfielder Katie Boyd who did the damage Saturday against St. Ursula, and keepers Liza Benson and Alicia Gaulke combining for three saves (all by Benson) to give UA its 13th and final shutout – and its first unbeaten record.

"We pretty much take a goal scored against us personally now," said senior sweeper and co-captain Anne Stegmiller. "We've worked pretty hard to find the right combinations in the back, and Liza has just been awesome, she's improved so much from last year."

"This is something we've been building on the last two years," said McGee. "Last year's disappointment (UA lost in the second round of the tournament to Thomas Worthington) motivated this group to work harder than either of the last two. They're excited about starting the tournament, but they also know anything can happen in single-elimination. We just want to get that first win behind us now and go from there."

A win would advance the Bears, who received a first-round bye, into next Wednesday's district semifinals – probably for a rematch with Watterson.

Golden Bears earn first outright OCC title

The last three seasons have been marked with one accomplishment after another — such as its first district title in 1998 and a share of its first OCC title a year ago — for the Upper Arlington High School girls soccer team.

With a 4-0 victory Oct. 10 at home against Hilliard Darby, the Bears had a new achievement.

After tying Dublin Coffman for first in the OCC-Central Division at 4-0-1 last season, Upper Arlington earned its first outright conference championship with the win over the Panthers as it went 6-0 to capture the first OCC-

Cardinal title following realignment.

The Bears, who gave up just four regular-season goals, enter the postseason at 14-0-2 as it beat Watterson 2-1 last Thursday and Cincinnati St. Ursula 3-0 last Saturday in non-league action.

"Last year was really neat because we won (the league title) for the first time ever, but we had to share it," said senior co-captain Claire DeWalt, whose team's only blemishes came with 1-all ties against Dublin Coffman (Sept. 12) and Worthington Kilbourne (Oct. 7). "We

were looking forward to getting it outright. Coach (Bob) McGee had us pumped up for it."

"It was something where we shared (the title) last year and then we realigned this year, so it's nice to be the first one to win after the change in the divisions," added McGee, whose third-seeded team opens the Division I tournament Thursday against visiting Whetstone, which beat Groveport 1-0 on penalty kicks last Monday in a first-round game.




1 decision.

Girls squad not looking ahead in pursuit of district

The Upper Arlington High School girls soccer team finally can put last year's tournament disaster out of its mind for good when it plays at 7 p.m. today against visiting Watterson.

A year ago, the third-seeded Bears defeated Newark 11-0 in a second-round Division I game but came up short in a district semifinal as they lost to eighth-seeded and eventual district champion Thomas Worthington.

Third-seeded Upper Arlington, which pounded Whetstone 14-0 last Thursday in a second-round home matchup to improve to 15-0-2, defeated the Eagles 2-1 on Oct. 12 as Sarah Wall and Lauren Pisciotta scored.

Watterson's goal was one of four the Bears allowed all season, as they have outscored opponents 69-4.

The winner will play host to seventh-seeded Olentangy or ninth-seeded Westerville North in a district final Saturday. UA beat the Braves 3-0 on Sept. 28 and did not play North.

"Coming into the season, the state championship was always in the back of our minds," said junior Mackenzie Tesner, who has a team-high 22 goals and recently was named the OCC-Cardinal Division Player of the Year.

"Winning the district is going to be what motivates us, but we're not looking ahead. Last year our season ended abruptly because we took Thomas Worthington too lightly.

"When we played (Watterson) two weeks ago, they took us by surprise when they scored a goal against us. We won't be taking them lightly because their middle is pretty strong and they've got some girls who can finish."

Watterson, which finished 16-4 overall a year ago after a 1-0 loss to Westerville South in a district championship game, improved to 8-6-2 with a 9-0 victory over Walnut Ridge

last Thursday.

"I'd say (Watterson is) extremely physical and hard-working," said coach Bob McGee, whose team won a district title two years ago. "They have a really talented player in Danielle Witchey, who runs the whole middle for them, and they've got (Rachel) Pivarnik in the back. I expect a very physical game, a battle. We'll just try to move it onto the floor with our speed.

"We're just focused on this one and not worrying about anything down the road. We're not talking about anything else, which is the same thing we've been doing all year long. We learned that lesson last year when Thomas came out and played one of their best games of the year and we couldn't even the score up."

The Bears had 10 players score against the Braves led by Tesner's three goals. Lindsay Zigler and Claire DeWalt both had two goals, while Katie Boyd, Wall, Annie Hatcher, Pisciotta, Alison Janowicz, Emily Bullock and Lauren Terakedis also scored. Liza Benson and Alicia Gaulke were not forced to make any saves because the Braves got no shots on goal.

Also receiving increased playing time were sophomores Whitney Crane, Sloan Devilivus and Nikki Mueller and freshman Danielle Wilkinson, who has split time on the junior varsity "A" and varsity.

"It was just one of those situations where we came out ready to play," said McGee, whose team's previous biggest victory came when it beat Athens 11-0 on Sept. 16.

"We scored 23 seconds into the game on our first shot, taken from Sarah Wall. She just drilled it, and we kind of shocked them I think. On our second shot we scored, we missed the third one and then we scored again.

"I think for most of the second half, some of the kids that don't get to play a lot saw some action. We were able to bring some kids up from the j.v. team also."

UA girls nudge North, earn district title

After nearly three months of gruelling practices and 19 games, the Upper Arlington High School girls soccer team's district championship was decided by a mere three

inches.

"I think Meredith didn't realize she had as much time as she had," Lawrence said.


But the reason North's opportunities were so limited was because the UA defense was so tough.

"I think we learned a lot last year," he said. "From day one these girls have shown they do not like to lose, and when someone pushes them, they push right back."


Case in point: last Wednes-

Tesner both tallied the first 40 minutes to give UA a comfortable 2-0 edge at the half, and despite an Eagles penalty kick goal early in the second period, the Bears never lost their momentum, McGee said.

Wall added an insurance goal against the tiring Eagles with 40 seconds to play for the final 3-1 verdict. UA outshot Watterson 17-9, with an 8-1 edge in corner kicks. Goalie Liza Benson tallied seven saves.

As satisfying as a second win in one season over Watterson was for his squad, McGee feels Saturday's hard-fought district title win over Westerville North may be even more important for the Bears' confidence heading into tonight's regional semifinal against Dublin Coffman at Westerville South. The Shamrocks (13-3-2) the fourth-seeded team in the district, upset No. 2 seed Worthington Kilbourne 1-0 Saturday for their first-ever district title.

"I think both the North and Watterson games gave our kids a lot of confidence they can play strong competition and win, even without one of our top players," McGee said, referring to the absence of senior co-captain and sweeper Anne Stegmiller for both of last week's tournament games.

Stegmiller is expected to be fully recovered for tonight's contest.

The game offers UA yet another emotional rematch against one of the two teams to mar the Bears' otherwise-perfect 17-0-2 mark. The 'Rocks played UA to a 1-1 tie four weeks ago, and shared the OCC championship last year after a scoreless deadlock.

"We didn't come out strong that first game," Dewalt said. "I think we were a little nervous after tying them the year before, and we wound up trading free kicks."

"This time we know what to expect. They have two great forwards (juniors Anna Massenelli and Megan Lindberg), and a very quick defense you can't turn on easily, so we have to play more one-touch soccer and make sure their at-

tacking players don't get behind us on defense, because they like to play a lot of over-the-top and through balls."

"It all comes down at this point to who plays their game and steps forward the best," McGee added. "This team set some very ambitious goals, and after Wednesday we'll see where we are and prepare accordingly."

If the Bears win, they'll face either Vandalia Butler or DeSales Saturday afternoon at Hilliard Davidson for the regional crown and a trip to the state final four. Should the opponent be the Stallions, it will mark McGee's first contest against his former team since moving to UA three years ago.

"I'm sure it will be a little weird, but we're not even thinking of that until after (tonight)," he said.

UA escapes North in district final

Last Saturday's middle-bracket Division I district final between the Upper Arlington and Westerville North high school girls soccer teams came down to a matter of inches, perhaps three or four at the most.

The third-seeded Golden Bears prevailed 1-0, scoring when Sarah Wall emerged from a cluster in front of visiting North's net to nudge the ball just past the line with 1 minute, 40 seconds remaining in the first half.

"It was that close, wasn't it?" Upper Arlington coach Bob McGee said. "Those few inches were the difference."

The Golden Bears captured their second district title and first since 1998, improving to 17-0-2 overall as the Warriors finished 10-4-4 while losing for the first time in nine matches dating to a Sept. 30 setback against Cuyahoga Falls Walsh Jesuit, the state's top-ranked Division II team.

Upper Arlington will play Dublin Coffman — which upended second-seeded Worthington Kilbourne 1-0 in last Saturday's upper-bracket final — in a regional semifinal at 7 p.m. today at Westerville South. Top-seeded

DeSales won the lower-bracket final, beating sixth-seeded Thomas Worthington 5-0 last Saturday.

"We watched North play one of the most difficult schedules of any team in the area, so we knew we'd have our hands full," McGee said. "This was one of the best games we played all year, though, and we needed it."

Upper Arlington goalkeeper Liza Benson had three saves to preserve the shutout, while her counterpart, North's Amber Angermeier, had two stops to help the Warriors stay within striking distance.

"As a whole I thought we controlled play, and we really had some great chances to tie it late in the game," said North coach Tim Lawrence, whose team held a 9-6 shot advantage but managed only one corner kick to Upper Arlington's three. "Give UA credit. They're a defensive-oriented team (allowing only five goals all season), and we did everything we could to try and counter that with the wind at our backs in the second half."

Ninth-seeded North's best chance at forcing overtime came with 15:55 remaining. Lauren Scott's attempt drew Benson out right of the net, and when the rebound squirted loose Meredith Frendt blasted a shot that

missed wide right, again only by inches.

"I don't think Meredith realized how much time she really had," Lawrence said. "But we can walk away feeling pretty good about this game. The team that won was the team that caught a break."

Both teams had to play without some key figures.


Upper Arlington defender Anne Stegmiller was sidelined with a concussion, with Claire DeWalt moving back from the midfield to play sweeper, and Alison Janowicz was out with a stress fracture. North was missing defender Katie Czekanski because of an ankle injury, with freshman Nicole Klemp starting in her place, while forward Kristin Clark continued to play despite being slowed with a season-long foot problem. North midfielder Lydia Michkovsky has been sidelined all season with an injury, too.

"Neither of us were all at full strength and it was still a great match to watch," McGee said.

goals allowed all season by the Bears, along with Thomas Worthington (2-1 win Sept. 26), Worthington Kilbourne (1-all tie Oct. 7) and Dublin Coffman (1-all tie Sept. 12), which will be Upper Arlington's regional semifinal opponent today at Westerville South.

UA girls hit with soccer loss when it hurt most

It's hard to imagine a span of 17 seconds spoiling what has been the most successful soccer season in Upper Arlington High School history.

But as Golden Bears senior co-captain Anne Stegmiller noted after last week's 2-1 regional semifinal loss to Dublin Coffman, "It's what you do in the tournament that people most remember, the way you finish."

In time the sting will ease. But what Stegmiller and her teammates are remembering this week is the final, fleeting seconds of the Nov. 1 contest at West-

erville South High School.

And the second and ultimately fatal defensive mistake by a team that had prided itself on its defensive prowess en route to a record-breaking 17-0-1 season mark and its second district championship in three years.

"It's a shame that ultimately it was two defensive mistakes that led to the goals," Bears coach Bob McGee noted. "But they (Coffman) came in and played a better game. Their center midfielders completely controlled the mid-field and took us out of what we wanted to do, and their defense really did a nice job on our forwards."

"We were two evenly-matched teams that play a very similar game," Stegmiller said. "We knew it was going to be a battle."

But that battle was, for the most part, one-sided de-

spite the narrow final margin.

The Shamrocks (16-3-2) outshot UA 15-8 and, more tellingly, created five corner kicks to just one for the Bears.

"One of our biggest areas of emphasis this season was to create corners and goal kicks, and we got just one," McGee said. "That more than anything shows how much they controlled the play."

UA (17-1-1) actually had the first good scoring chance when sophomore forward Katie Boyd got a step on the defense at 24:25 of the first half, but missed wide.

Coffman's stepped-up pressure, sparked by the midfield play of Anna Massenelli, Julie Fox and Cara Hemmerich, finally helped crack the deadlock.

With 18:24 left to half-time Coffman created its first corner, and Sarah Cole's cross went to the far post, where Hemmerich split a trio of Bears defenders for a header into the right corner and a 1-0 Shamrocks lead.

"I don't know why, but we just stood there," McGee said. "It looked like everyone just expected someone else to move, and no one did."

Three more Coffman shots either missed or were saved by Bears keeper Liza Benson before UA earned its lone corner of the game with 47 seconds left before halftime, but Lauren Pisciotto's cross sailed wide.

"They were taking away our wide passes and forcing us to work up the middle," McGee explained. "We needed to be more patient, to use two and three more passes to the feet to get the ball where we wanted it, but instead we started playing more kickball than we normally do."

As a result, Coffman began creating more and more attacks on won balls in the midfield, and the Bears had to rely on counterattacks or mistakes for any scoring threats at all. And with 24:04 to play, one mistake evened the game.

Boyd, making a run down the left side, beat Cole into the box and was taken down from behind. Sarah Wall's penalty kick easily beat Shamrocks goalie Shannon Neely, and UA had new life.

"I was worried how we'd react after the PK," Coffman coach Mike Walker admitted. "But if anything the girls seemed to get angry, and we had the better of play from that point on."

In the ensuing 22 minutes the Shamrocks put seven more shots on goal, with Benson making three saves and the rest missing wide or high. After a final Coffman corner produced a missed header with 3:11 to play, it appeared the contest was headed to a 20-minute overtime.

"I know I was thinking (OT)," Stegmiller said.

"I thought that's what might happen," added Massenelli. "But I wanted to finish it (in regulation)."

With the final minute of play ticking down, Coffman won the ball out of bounds at midfield. An initial throw-in was kicked out, and Coffman forward Megan Lindberg hurriedly threw a second ball in the direction of freshman forward Lindy Slinger, streaking down the right side.

"I thought it was a bad throw-in," McGee said, and apparently so did several of the Bears defenders.

"It (the throw) looked like it came in funny," Stegmiller remembered. "It's possible some people were expecting it to be called back, but I didn't hear a whistle, so I kept playing."

By then, however, Slinger had gotten by a pair of UA defenders and had taken the ball deep into the right corner, from where she sent a hard cross into the box.

With Massenelli charging in from the far side, Benson came off the line to make a diving save, but the ball bounced out of her hands as she hit the ground.

"She started to knock me over as the ball came out," the Coffman junior said, "and I just got enough of a foot on it to get it over her."

The ball dribbled into the net with 17 seconds showing on the clock.

The shocked Bears got the ball into the Coffman third, but the Shamrocks defense easily booted the ball away to kill the remaining seconds and UA's dream of a second regional final visit in three years.

"It's hard now, because this is the first time we've had to experience defeat this season," McGee pointed out. "I know the seniors, in particular, had high expectations this year, which is good, because when you set your sights high you work harder, and good things usually happen."

"We're still bringing this program along, and as we progress we'll develop the attitude you need to win in the tournament's higher levels. Before two years ago we'd never won a district - now we've been there twice. When you look at where we started, and how far we've come, and the records we set this year, there will be a lot to look back on with pride."

Right now, though, there's 17 seconds of this record-setting 2000 season UA's girls would rather forget.

Record-setting season ends in regional semi

The Upper Arlington High School girls soccer program has come a long way over the last three years.

During coach Bob McGee's first season in 1998, the Bears earned the school record for wins as they went 16-3-1 and went on to earn their first district championship. They followed by winning their first OCC-Cardinal Division championship a year ago while going 12-4-2.

Things got even better this season for Upper Arlington. In addition to going 6-0 in the conference to win their first outright title, the Bears tied the school record for most goals (74, previously set in 1998) and broke school marks in fewest goals allowed (seven), most wins (17) fewest losses (one) and most shutouts (14).

The campaign also marked the first time Upper Arlington had three consecutive winning seasons, as McGee became the program's all-time wins leader (45-8-7 overall), surpassing program-founder Dick Henry (38-37-11 from 1982-85 and 1987) and Terry Johnson (38-37-8 from 1993-97).

Upper Arlington, which defeated Westerville North 1-0 on Oct. 28 to earn its second district championship, lost 2-1 to Dublin Coffman on Nov. 1 in a Division I regional semifinal to finish 17-1-2 overall.

"I think we're going to look back and realize how good of a season it

was," said junior Sarah Wall, who had 15 goals and seven assists and is the program's fourth-leading scorer with 32 goals.

"To go undefeated until the tournament is huge."

The Bears, who tied Coffman at 1 Sept. 12 after tying the Shamrocks for the OCC-Central title a year ago at 4-0-1 before realignment this season, fell behind with 18 minutes, 24 seconds to go in the first half of the regional semifinal when Cara Hemmerich scored on a header off Sarah Cole's corner kick.

Upper Arlington tied it at 1 on a penalty kick by Wall with 24 minutes remaining, but had few opportunities after that. With 17 seconds remaining, Coffman's Anna Massenelli scored on a cross from Lindy Slinger and knocked it in for the victory.

It was the first time all season the Bears gave up more than one goal in a game, as they allowed just four during the regular season, with one coming in a 1-all tie Oct. 7 at Worthington Kilbourne and another coming a 3-1 win over Watterson on Oct. 25 in a district semifinal.

Upper Arlington's other tournament win came in the second round against Whetstone (14-0 on Oct. 19).

"I don't think we played our best game (against Coffman)," said McGee, who earned his 100th coaching victory when the Bears beat Olenetangy 3-0 on Sept. 28 and has a career record of 107-19-16 overall (62-11-9 from 1993-96 at DeSales). "Glee

credit to Coffman. To give up a goal with 17 seconds to go was tough. I think we were kind of shocked by that. We didn't make the great play and they did.

"I think for us since I've been here, we've gone from obscurity to becoming a power in central Ohio, which is hard to do. Next year I've got all of those juniors coming back, some of them will have been with me for four straight years."

Upper Arlington will lose four seniors led by Claire DeWalt, who was the OCC-Cardinal Player of the Year as a junior and came back with five goals and seven assists as she moved from sweeper to center-midfielder, and Anne Stegmiller, who was a defensive starter and was second-team all-OCC. DeWalt was first-team all-OCC and first-team all-district.

The other seniors were Emily Bullock and Andrea Waite.

The Captain Kozlowski repeats top honor

Tesia Kozlowski's immense talent stems from a concoction that is one part natural ability, one part dedication and one part heredity.

Mix them all together and you have the ingredients for a superstar, one who has been named the captain of the *ThisWeek* Super 12 girls soccer team for the second consecutive season. Kozlowski, a DeSales High School senior center-midfielder who had 12 goals going into today's state semifinal against Cincinnati Mother of Mercy, also has earned the district and state Division I Player of the Year awards for the second time.

"The honors I keep getting are kind of overwhelming," said Kozlowski, who last week made a verbal commitment to continue her career at the University of Dayton. "I work hard and everything, but it's like, 'Wow. Do I really deserve all this?'"

Opposing coaches tend to believe so. "The thing about Tesia, and we've all seen it for the past four years, is that she has this ability to really control the game on so many levels," Westerville North coach Tim Lawrence said. "She really makes her teammates shine, and that's the mark of a great player. Her deft touch, her ability to make quality passes and the way she reads the game, those are the things you notice right away."

Kozlowski, a National Soccer Coaches of America Association All-American last season, is the fifth of six siblings in a family of soccer enthusiasts that includes her brother, Erik, a DeSales freshman. Her parents, Michael and Joyce, moved to Westerville four years ago from Cleveland, where Kozlowski still plays club ball with the Internationals.

"It all started when Tesia was very small and she learned the game from watching everyone else," Joyce Kozlowski said. "We have her on video learning to walk and she was already carrying a soccer ball."

Kozlowski, the first repeat captain for the Super 12, used to play basketball and also was active in gymnastics until choosing to focus on soccer. A National Honors Society member, she remains an avid skier.

Kozlowski joins Thomas Worthington's Ashley Swinehart, the 1998 captain, as a three-time Super 12 selection. Dublin Scioto's Kathy Fulk is the only four-time Super 12 pick. Kozlowski's former teammate and DeSales goalkeeper Mindy Hammond captained the inaugural Super 12 team in 1997.
